NHShorty & Buffalobill's between Christmas & New Year's Cruise and Visit

Day 1 and Day 2, December 25 & 26, 2013

Trip Overview:

This trip was a combination 3 day cruise on the Disney Dream, followed by 3 days/2 nights at WDW.

Because NHShorty has now been on 6 Disney Cruises and this was Buffalobill's first ever cruise, we will try to present both of our perspectives in this report.

Day 1 details:


One of the early highlights of the cruise was the safety briefing at our lifeboat station. Turns out those are not yellow submarines after all.
